



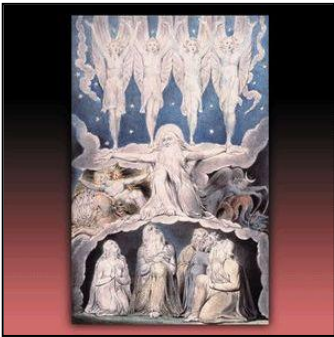

Answer to Job is among the most seminal and personal of Jung's writings. Intellectually, it represents his effort to grapple psychologically (and, dare we say, *theologically*) with Christianity's dualistic understanding of the nature of evil, an understanding he finds wholly inadequate. Personally -- "I have been occupied with its central problem for years" -- it is the testament of a 77 year old man who had spent his life exploring the inner world of humankind and concluded our relationship to what we call "evil" must be revisioned. Jung correctly anticipated this work would be controversial -- and it was, costing him his friendship with the Roman Catholic theologian Victor White. This reading group will consider *Job's* place in Jung's writing and his life. It is one in a series of courses, discussion groups, and reading groups Steve offers on Jung & the Spiritual Journey.
